- Prepare your home by securing loose objects, closing windows and doors, and protecting valuable objects if you have time before severe weather strikes.

What Is a Severe Weather Warning?

A severe weather warning indicates imminent danger to life or property. These warnings are typically issued over a small area where severe weather has been reported. Here are some guidelines for how you should take action following a severe weather warning:

- Take shelter in a substantial building.
- Bring your pets inside if you have time
- Stay away from windows.
- Avoid large rooms, such as cafeterias and auditoriums, at work or school.
- Never take shelter under a tree.
- Drive to the closest secure shelter if you're in your vehicle and have time.
- Listen to the local radio or the NOAA Weather Radio to stay updated once you're in a safe location.
